

## **SPECIAL REPORT: Toxic Achievement Culture**

hoolTV. Toxic achievement culture is characterised by the entanglement of self-worth, achievement and the relentless pursuit of academic or extracurricular success - at any cost! This phenomenon goes beyond the mere quest for success. It embeds a belief in students that

their merit is exclusively tied to their achievements, often propelled by intense external pressures from families, schools, and society.

Some students are overfilling their schedules with activities aimed at "getting ahead". However, the consequences are proving to be detrimental on students' mental and physical health resulting in burnout and heightened levels of stress. This culture is also being aggravated by parental expectations, peer competition and a relentless comparison ethos often driven by social media.

There is nothing wrong with having ambition, but it's crucial to ensure that this desire doesn't push our young people into a toxic cycle of achievement and make them feel that they must achieve in order to matter. The relentless drive to excel is leading many students to prioritise accolades over genuine learning and personal growth, often at the expense of their own wellbeing and interpersonal relationships. As adult carers, we need to advocate for a more balanced and holistic approach to achievement, emphasising the importance of resilience, wellbeing, and the pursuit of diverse interests.

This Special Report will help you understand the signs of toxic achievement, and how to address them so as to teach students how to adopt a better work/life balance.

#### **Disability Provisions for HSC Examinations 2024**

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) provides special accommodations for students facing significant disadvantages due to conditions hindering their performance in examination settings. To access these accommodations, students must undergo an application process. Those who believe they may qualify are encouraged to consult with Mrs. Sarah Cunningham or myself.

#### NAPLAN 2024 - Year 7 and Year 9

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. NAPLAN has moved to Term 1 and will take place from **Wednesday 13 March to Monday 25 March 2024**.

NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2024, our school will undertake activities to help students to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked.

Students and parents can access the public demonstration site to familiarise themselves with NAPLAN and the types of questions and tools available. Excessive preparation for NAPLAN is not required nor recommended.

Disability adjustments, which reflect the student's normal level of support in the classroom, may be provided. Access to disability adjustments or exemption from the tests must be discussed with the Director, Teaching and Learning, Mr Nash Clark or with the Coordinator of Learning Enhancement, Mrs Sarah Cunningham. A parent or carer consent form must be signed and returned to the College and will be provided on request. Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer after consultation with the College. To withdraw your child from NAPLAN, a parent or carer consent form must be signed. #### Years 10-12 Assessment Tasks

Across Years 10, 11, and 12, students have received assessment schedules outlining the assessment tasks for the year in each subject.

If a student in Years 10–12 is unable to submit or sit an assessment task due to illness or mishap, a strict set of protocols must be followed, as detailed in the assessment policy booklets distributed to all students in Years 10–12. These booklets are accessible on the College website under the 'Newsletters, Handbooks, and Policies' section, labelled as 'Handbooks'. Initially, parents and caregivers are advised to contact the Director of Teaching and Learning, Mr. Nash Clark, upon identifying that a student will miss an assessment task.

As a general guideline, parents and caregivers should contact me if their child's assessment tasks are impacted. We will then discuss the subsequent steps to be taken.

For students in Years 7-9, if they are unable to submit or sit an assessment task, they should communicate with their classroom teacher to arrange alternative arrangements.

#### **Australian Mathematics Competition - 2024**

St Paul's students from Years 7 to 12 can be involved in the Australian Mathematics Competition. This competition allows students to challenge themselves to solve unique mathematical problems, with the goal to demonstrate the importance and relevance of mathematics in students' everyday lives. Students will be required to use higher order thinking and problem-solving skills in Mathematics to test their knowledge against students of the same age from all over Australia. For those who signup for this challenge, the competition will be held in early Term 3, during the school day.

The Math Department strongly encourage you to discuss this opportunity with your child and suggest that they have a go at the AMC. The competition is suitable for all students wishing to extend themselves academically and take up the personal challenge of competing in a national competition. The nature of the questions does not mean that a student must be in an advanced class or even think they are good at Maths, it tests their ability to problem solve and think through problems there is no need for prior study or revision.

AMC will be an online competition, allowing greater accessibility for students and faster delivery of results. The competition will cost of \$8.50 per student. We are required to register students online. Thus, the closing date for SPC students to enter will be Wednesday 19 June.

SCIENCE MARKET 1

Science


The Science faculty has been in full swing to start 2024. The following gives a glimpse into our teaching and learning sequences within our senior cohorts this fortnight.

Year 11 Chemistry exploring the emission spectra of various metals, using spectroscopes to isolate the various wavelengths of light emitted (top left, bottom left).

Year 11 Physics designed an experiment to collect first hand data to calculate the acceleration due to gravity (left).

Year 11 Biology - Bella & Lily modelling the structure of a double cell membrane, using cake and marshmallows (bottom, middle)


Year 11 Biology exploring the impact of temperature on cell membrane function (by comparing the leeching of beetroot at various temperatures) (bottom, right)



Chemistry Day at Charles Sturt University, Wagga Wagga. Students used an Atomic Absorption Spectrometer (AAS) to compare the concentration of iron in Nutrigrain to ts published nutritional information, experimentally determined the equilibrium coefficient of iron thiocyanate, titrimetrically determined the concentration of acetic acid in vinegar and enjoyed a series of demonstrations to explore increasing rates of chemical reactions. The students were excellent representatives of our College and we thank the Eastern Riverina Science Teachers Association and Charles Sturt University for organising and running this excellent opportunity

## Year 9 English

In Year 9 English we are studying First Nation Voices and writing poetry in the style of awardwinning Gunai woman, Kirli Saunders poem 'Wildflower'. Aiden Lacey's poem 'Deep Roots' draws on trees as symbolising nature's strength and alludes to our human need to be nurtured and safe in order to grow into strong, healthy people.

Students have also been working with the stud flock and commercial flock completing routine husbandry practices, as well as preparing for Henty Show.

During the holidays, some students attended the NH Foods Angus Youth National Roundup held at Tamworth in January. There were many successes through the week and we are very proud of the students achievements in these areas. Students participated in several workshops throughout the day including speaking, merino judging, fleece judging, cattle judging, meat sheep judging and grain judging. Students had the opportunity to hear and learn from industry experts in these fields and gain valuable experience and advice for judging in these fields.

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

Discover Medicine at UNSW. Join staff and current students to learn about the program, learning experience and admissions process.


